What is one's greater purpose?

The discovery of one's greater purpose begins with recognizing that a human life is not happen-stance, but rather each life has a God-given purpose. This discovery process must look beyond one's self to one's greater purpose which is found outside of self. We are not created to exist alone. In reality, value does not exist except in an exchange between two parties, implying that a life is meaningless (or lacking value) without relationships with other people.

While there is a unique purpose for each life, there is a common purpose for all people, which is in serving others. Specifically, how we serve others depends on our God-given gifts and talents and how we employ those gifts, talents, and resources in the service and benefit of others.

The education we provide develops both the general purpose of a life that flows out (character) and the specific application of that general purpose (skills and knowledge). In other words, our assumption is that each life exists to serve others, and the unique gifts and abilities determine how each of us expresses that service to others. This is in contrast to the assumption that a life exists only to gather and amass possessions – a life with this purpose is meaningless.

The students that come to us are seeds with DNA specific to each. Our job as educators is to create the environment that nurtures the seed growing into what it was created to produce. Consider the continuum graphically shown below. The development of one's greater purpose can be seen as moving from left to right – from being served to serving others, from flowing inwards to flowing outwards, from focused on building up self, to building up others. A life that moves to the right finds greater value because its investment is made in those things most valuable in this world. Likewise Hallmark University identifies with this greater purpose as an institution, existing not to build up the institution itself (measured by assets), but rather to build up people (measured by lives changed). The legacy that we leave is not in the physical assets that we amass, but rather the lives that are nurtured and developed towards their greater purpose.

What does "consistent with biblical principles" mean for Hallmark University?

Much of higher education has abandoned the concept that there is absolute truth, right, morality, and good defined outside of the definitions each individual chooses.
